Call for Presentations Now Open

The Soil and Water Conservation Society invites the submission of live demos, virtual tours, field days, workshops, oral presentations, symposia, and posters for the 76th SWCS International Annual Conference, taking place virtually, July 26-28, 2021.

The Annual Conference Program Planning Committee has identified four special topic areas. These specialty tracks, along with the general conference track, are open for submissions. Special consideration will be given to presentations that cater to the conference theme.

The three-day event will provide the opportunity for attendees around the world to share their conservation stories and bring natural resource management solutions from far and wide into their homes and offices. The virtual event format allows access and inclusivity on a broad scale, and our interactive conference platform provides a robust conference experience with live sessions, Q&A, networking, a virtual exhibit hall, and many other ways to learn, connect, and engage.



This year's conference theme, "One World, Connected through Conservation," encompasses the shared resources on which all life depends while recognizing local-level issues and management. No matter the landscape, collective efforts are required to protect and sustain our soil and water resources. While conservation challenges brought on by universal pressures like climate change may produce wide-ranging effects in our respective corners of the globe, there is commonality in the solutions—collaborations that span sectors and disciplines, practices informed by science, cutting-edge technology, a new era of policy, and, at the center of all this, the individuals working tirelessly to protect and improve our natural resources.

Professionals advancing conservation solutions through research and practice in public and private sectors will present their work, including the latest in soil health, water resources, conservation management, climate change adaptation, social science, and more. Workshops, symposia sessions, and posters will showcase ideas, technologies, and practices, and foster a dialogue around their adoption. Projects presented will include work at the watershed, national, and international scales, emphasizing the global impact of local efforts. Scientists and practitioners will apply the virtual skills they have obtained over the last year by taking attendees into the field and lab through live or prerecorded demonstrations and tours. Recognizing that our goals for the world's natural resources cannot be realized without justice, equity, diversity and inclusion, conservationists will share insights and advice on projects and partnerships that seek diverse participation and take meaningful action toward creating and supporting systems that value and serve people equitably.

In addition to science and practice presentations, the event will provide a range of opportunities for personal and professional development. Sessions will address effective work habits, partnerships, and communication tools, and the conference will offer certified education credits (CEUs).

and agencies, and together, through this conference and its impact, we will build a future for global conservation.

2020: The Year in Review

This year has been filled with unexpected challenges for all of us, but SWCS, our members, supporters, partners, and friends have proved to be resilient, and together our resiliency is magnified. In 2020 SWCS has had many accomplishments—here are just a few!

This year SWCS celebrated its <u>75th Anniversary</u>. We created an onsite historical display, shared artifacts and archives online, and boosted our social media presence and engagement, forging relationships with other leaders in soil and water history and establishing SWCS as a leader in the conservation movement and profession.




- 2. In the spring, SWCS updated the <u>Journal of Soil and Water Conservation</u> (JSWC) website to include a responsive design, publish ahead of print capabilities, and new opportunities for online advertising, among other features. The JSWC also published four special topic issues, and published a total of 89 articles.
- 3. We had the pleasure of continuing our internship program this year, hiring Joe Derry as our first virtual intern! Thank you to internship sponsor ARCSE.
- 4. In June, the SWCS Science and Policy Committee delivered a letter to the US House and Senate Agriculture Committees, making the case for conservation technical assistance (CTA) and conservation as a form of infrastructure.
- 5. Although total membership declined, SWCS gained 233 new members in 2020. (Don't forget to renew your membership and enourage other to join!)
- 6. This year we streamlined the awards and nomination process, doubling award submissions! Read about our 2020 award winners.
- 7. This summer SWCS recruited three new Board members—Keith Berns, Ellen Gilinksy, and Jerry Hatfield—who have hit the ground running in their efforts to support our mission.

8. In July SWCS held the International Annual Conference as a virtual event for the first time. The 75th Annual Conference assembled a diverse, multigenerational conservation community of nearly a thousand researchers, practitioners, industry leaders, farmers, and students from around the world to discuss advancements in soil and water research.



- 9. Throughout the year SWCS launched a series of new swag campaigns, selling merchandise for our community of conservation professionals to enjoy.
- 10. SWCS officially began four projects in 2020! (1) The Conservation Practitioner Poll, with funding from the Walton Family Foundation, will allow SWCS and Iowa State University to create a first-of-its-kind survey to conservation practitioners who work hand-in-hand with farmers in the Mississippi River Basin. (2) and (3) SWCS and Truterra began work on two NRCS-funded grants to complete soil health-focused on-farm trials with retailer cooperatives in Nebraska, Kansas, and Iowa. (4) SWCS will work with NRCS to convene Blue Ribbon Panels to identify, review and evaluate various conservation technologies. We are grateful to all our partners, members and funders who have made this important work possible!
- 11. In December SWCS published Soil and Water Conservation: A Celebration of 75 Years. Decades of published research and in-field experience were distilled into informative chapters that provide perspective on the complex relationships between land managers and the environment in the face of current challenges, such as a changing climate, shrinking water resources, a growing global population, and shifting land uses.
