

From the SWCS Archives

Regardless of your age or background, conservation is an issue that impacts everyone. Since the 1950s, the Society has produced millions of comic-style booklets geared toward kids of all ages. The first one was published in 1959 and was the result a celebrity collaboration with the creator of the "Dennis the Menace" comic strip—Hank Ketcham. In 1957, Ketcham attended the Society's annual meeting in Pacific Grove, California. While there he was inspired to install water conservation practices on his ranch in Monterey County. He then took it one step further by adapting the Society's message of soil conservation into a comic book featuring Dennis Mitchell, his parents, and his forlorn neighbor, Mr. Wilson.

In this comic Dennis learns about the importance of soil conservation through Mr. Mitchell's telling him where food and forest products come from. In the end, six-year-old Dennis is so impressed with soil conservation that he literally "saves" soil by trucking bucketloads of the stuff into the Mitchell's living room (much to the dismay of his parents)! This whimsical take on soil conservation connected the Society to a brand new (and much younger) audience.
